And the ECFA Award goes to...

ECFA has continued to increase its number of members this year, and amongst them we find various children's film festivals. Some of our new and old members have expressed a wish to get even more involved in ECFA and we are proud to inform readers of the ECFA Journal that, for the very first time, there will be an ECFA jury at a children's film festival. The initiative came from Ciné-Jeune de l'Aisne Festival in St. Quentin, France, wondering if it would be possible to host an ECFA jury. The board of ECFA was excited to try this as a pilot project, and we feel that such a jury is a good example of our aim to "coordinate any initiative taken in favour of cinema for children and youth". The first ECFA jury will consist of three ECFA members, awarding the best European film in competition.

The board of ECFA believes that establishing juries in European festivals is both a good way to strengthen the organisation itself by providing new meeting grounds for our members, but it will also help to promote European children's films. We will therefore encourage all our member festivals to consider establishing an ECFA jury in the upcoming year.

The Kristiansand International Children's Film Festival, Norway, will have an ECFA jury in the upcoming Mayedition. If enough festivals form ECFA juries in 2011 we plan to nominate all the winners for a yearly ECFA Award for Best European Children's Film, so finally we have found a way to establish such a much needed prize. We hope to present an ECFA Award for Best European Children's Film 2012 at our AGM in Berlin in 2012. I encourage all festivals who are interested in ECFA juries to contact the administration, and thus contribute to make 2011 a continuous festive year for the European children's film.

A Festival Focus on the UK, Northern Ireland and Ireland

It seems that we are moving into an age of a real festival culture in the UK and Ireland. After a long period of nobody really knowing what a film festival was about, apart from those working on them, we seem to have moved into an age of having a film festival in every month and every city. With the 20th anniversary of Belfast's Cinemagic Festival and the sad news about the Showcomotion festival in Sheffield coming to an end, it seemed fitting to bring a varied selection of festivals throughout the UK and Ireland to your attention.

* 20th Coca-Cola Cinemagic International Film and Television Festival for Young People, 11th - 26th November 2010. Belfast, Northern Ireland

Cinemagic caters for young people (from 4 to 25 years) with just about every level of interest in film – whether they want to watch and enjoy, create their own work or take things further and find out more about the film industry. Cinemagic strongly believes that moving image offers the most accessible ways of stimulating discussion among young people. Designed for and by young people the festival includes an array of international screenings, premieres, director discussions, special guests, school packages along with an annual Young Filmmaker Competition.

Cinemagic's masterclasses with leading industry professionals have spanned a wide range of genres from Directing, Production, Scriptwriting, Acting, Design (costume and set) right through to Music Soundtracks, 3D Modeling, Cinematography, Visual Effects, Performance Combat, VJing, Animation and Puppeteering.

Programmer Chris Shaw gives insight in the anniversary edition: "We will be programming a number of special events. Throughout the festival we will be offering young people the opportunity to take part in industry events including the Talent Lab masterclass series and our comprehensive education program. An international youth jury will be selecting the best films and the festival will culminate with a gala night at Belfast's historic City Hall."

Zoom is a registered charity helping children and young people from disadvantaged communities in the South Wales Valleys to overcome the obstacles of social and economic disadvantage. Zoom works with young people aged 8 to 18 and provides them with access to a year-round program of film and digital media activities, and pathways to training, education and employment. Zoom also has a Young People's Film Council. This is a consultative forum with a core representation of young people from the local communities.

New Director Matt Redd: "We have formed a strategic partnership with the PICS festival in North Wales, with the long-term goal of expanding our reach across the country to create a truly international festival for Wales. Our focus remains with children and young people, and so we are now developing a wide program of training activity that will run year round."

Unfortunately it seems that Showcomotion (Sheffield) is no longer with us. After trying to confirm this but with no one commenting on the status of the festival it can only be assumed that Showcomotion has closed it's doors – at least for the moment. Former Director Kathy Loizou now heads the Children's Media Conference in Sheffield and Gez Walker has moved on from The Showroom. I was unable to obtain confimed information from host venue The Showroom on the situation of the festival.

As I write this, it has just been announced that the UK Film Council is to be shut down by the new government during it's regime of extensive budget cuts. This is a disastrous situation for the film industry in the UK as the UKFC is the national funding body. It has been widely discussed by colleagues and the media of the cuts in the budgets for the arts as the 2012 Olympics is drawing more and more funding to cover its excessive costs. Asking the festivals to comment on this it seemed that it was a 50/50 split of people who agreed and felt the consequences of this and others who had no experience of a loss in funding to sport and the Olympics.

As you can see there is no shortage of festivals. During this economic recession organizations have proved themselves surprisingly resilient. How has the economic downturn affected the festivals? Across all of these festivals budgets have either been frozen or cut which has had consequences on the size of programs being delivered. However, from responses I have received this has only increased the passion, pride and need for these festivals to exist. (Adam Graham)

BOS BROS.

Bos Bros. will present 4 new films for a young audience in 2011.

- THE ZIGZAG KID (after a book by David Grossman) is Vincent Bal's first film since MINOES. Nono takes advices from his father – the world's best policeman – but usually ends up in trouble. During a train journey to see his uncle, Nono enters a world full of disguises and mysterious women.

In 2011 Vincent Bal will adapt another Annie M.G. Schmidt (MINOES) book: WIPLALA lives in a kitchen behind the peanut butter jar. TOM SPACE is another project with Vincent's name on it. In a 3D sci fi adventure, a 12 year old boy takes a group of retired people on a trip through the outskirts of the universe.

- ALFIE THE LITTLE WEREWOLF is a well known hero among the very young readers. When gentle Alfie, on his seventh birthday, suddenly turns into a werewolf he learns to accept his new identity.
 ALLEZ EDDY! is a Belgian co-production by Gert Embrechts about 11 year old promising cycling talent Freddy. At the dawn of a new era (the first supermarket is coming to town) Freddy prepares for his first race. The winner will shake hands with the great Eddy Merckx.
- BRAM THE MAN (by Anna van der Heide) can't sit still. That usually doesn't cause too much problems until he ends up in the class of a very strict teacher.

Plans for 2011:

- Bos Bros. plans a remake of the Spanish PLANTA 4A, Antonio Mercero's film about the brave bold heads in the hospital's cancer section.

IN FOCUS: WILLY AND WILDA

Willy, whom we met in the short 'Willy and the Wild Rabbit' (2006) will soon get a new life on the big screen. In WILLY AND WILDA the two well-known protagonists build up their life in the wild woods. But the dream of freedom is easier than living it. Willy decides to return to the farm, only to get a new shock: a new rabbit has moved into his cage! Only after overcoming many barriers (including saving a bullied pheasant called Franz), Willy can truly say: I am now a rabbit standing on its own feet and I deserve the heart of Wilda, who turns out to be the most faithful friend that any rabbit can wish for.

Director and scriptwriter Lennart and Ylva-Li Gustafsson: "Several years ago we wanted to do a story about what happens when one loses a belonging to a group, a secure identity, and instead finds it in oneself. In those days we spent a lot of time hunting down one of our rabbits which all the time ran away to meet a rabbit girl further down the street..."

Flightplan Film started shooting in April with hand drawn 2D backgrounds based on real photography. The result will be a 74' animated feature, "still sweet but not sugared". Made on a € 2,2 million budget WILLY AND WILDA should premier in 2012. Flightplan will also create a TV-series based on the same characters.

THE SANDMAN AND THE LOST SAND OF DREAM

THE SANDMAN AND THE LOST SAND OF DREAM (by Sinem Sakauglu & Jesper Møller, 72') is a partly 3D-animated, partly live action film, based on the popular Sandman-character, an 'institute' in Germany's children TV culture. It's like he always has been around since he was introduced in a German TV-show in 1959. In numerous European countries children were sent to bed after his daily appearance on the screen. Sinem Sakaoglu: "He is a myth, almost sacred, and in this film for the first time we get to know more about him. He didn't even have a voice. We can't unveil the mystery too much. FRATELLI D'ITALIA

The title FRATELLI D'ITALIA - 'Brothers of Italy', the Italian national Hymn - reveals a certain irony. The film shows the difficulties, love and conflicts in the lives of immigrant teenagers, captured by the respectful camera of young Claudio Giovannesi. "I adopted the documentary approach", he says, "but wanted to build a film narrative". Before the shooting, the crew spent 3 weeks 'assimilated' into the classroom, until they became almost invisible. This was an opportunity for the director to understand the fragile scenario of multi-ethnic integration, reflected in the identity formation of teenagers. Their natural behavior in front of the camera makes it difficult to understand whether it is a documentary or a fiction. Claudio is working on a new film with non-professional adolescent actors.

THE MAGIC CRYSTAL

The team from NIKO - THE WAY TO THE STARS teams up again. Did you know that Santa has an evil twin brother? When Santa develops a magic crystal that makes it possible to multiply his efforts (and bring happiness to even more children), his brother Basil comes up with a diabolic plan. Thanks to the courage of a human boy, the crystal is saved by Santa's elfish crew. Even if the film fits into the Scandinavian Christmas tradition, THE MAGIC CRYSTAL (Antti Haikala & Igor Boris Bertolucci; 75') is closer to science fiction than to the classic Nordic mythology.

The story about a young outcast getting a favoured position in Santa's elite troops looks very similar the story of young reindeer Niko. With Epidem ZOT. FESTIVAL CINE-JEUNE DE L'AISNE

The Festival Ciné-Jeune de l'Aisne has set an extraordinary ambition: organizing two festivals within half a year. FIFEM GOES SCHLINGEL

The 15th Schlingel Festival (27 September - 3 October) in Chemnitz offers a focus on youth film production in Quebec, Canada, in cooperation with the Montreal International Children's Film Festival (FIFEM).

For almost 30 years, children films made in Quebec were the work of one man, producer Rock Demers, creator of the famous 'Tales for all' series. Nowadays, one young filmmaker, Xavier Dolan, seems to have single-handedly changed the local film scene. I KILLED MY MOTHER managed to win all the honors. Together with Christian Laurence (THE DIARY OF AURELIE LAFLAMME) they are a living proof of Quebec's vibrant children's films scene! Other titles in this carte blanche to FIFEM are RUNAWAY TRAIN (Cordell Barker) and

NOEMIE - THE SECRET (Frédérik d'Amours). Schlingel will also present some of these filmmakers. Programmer of the event is FIFEM's president Jo-Anne Blouin. For FIFEM's next edition (26th February - 6th March 2011) the exchange will be completed when 5 German films and directors will be hosted in Montreal.

PLEIN LA BOBINE CULINAIRE

The theme "food & cooking" was extremely visible in this year's June edition of the festival Plein la Bobine in La Bourboule. By choosing plenty of films about eating and by doing a lot of cooking at the festival, in screenings, workshops and diner events. There was even a real 'cooking battle': for the 'ioutes culinaires' a famous chef and a local slow food organisation were sent to the market to buy ingredients and make the audience the judge of their cooking contest. In the workshops children made snacks, pottered with vegetables or made Arcimboldo-like food portraits that were animated in film clips. Films made by children about/ with food were screened and a screening of WE FEED THE WORLD (Erwin Wagenhofer) was followed by a debate and a slow food diner.

Festival director Florence Dupont: "Such an initiative is not only possible in France. But it's true that the French perception of a festival helps to install such an event, since French festivals usually present a lot of archive films and retrospectives. We have a basic kitchen at the festival centre; all we needed were a few ovens and a good partnership, like we had with the slow food organisation.

The audience's reactions were very positive. We finally could attract and involve the grown-ups and parents, which is something we've aimed for for years."

HIGH FIVE RESULTS

* CHILDREN AND YOUTH FILM **FESTIVAL 'JUST FILM'**

For 9 years the Just Film Children and Youth Film Festival has been taking place in Tallinn (as a sub-event of the 'Black Nights Festival') and has become an important cultural event for young people in Estonia. Just Film's selection mainly consists of European films, getting Estonian children to find out more about the language, culture and traditions in other European countries.

Examining the needs of our target group, throughout the years our festival became a vivid link between young people and culture. Via the festival young people communicate and discuss topics that are seldom dealt with at school (drug abuse, sexuality, racism, etc.).

Films screened in the Just Film Festival speak about values and problems that are familiar to all. Watching a movie is like taking part in a simulation program: the viewer plays the same situation through in his/her mind to find multiple solutions to a problem. The themes in modern movie-making are relevant in Estonia too: conflicts at school, trouble with parents, getting used to a new environment, violence, becoming a full member of society, tolerance, finding inner peace. That's why we offer Estonian youngsters an opportunity to watch a modern type of films (VEGAS, SLINGSHOT HIP HOP, CARLITOS) that usually can't be found in our cinemas. * KOULUKINO

Koulukino (School Cinema, supported by the Ministry of Culture and Education) contributes to Finnish film education by organizing screenings for children in movie theatre's during school hours and by producing pedagogical material for teachers. All Finish cinemas made a commitment to arrange reduced-price school screenings on request. Formed in 2002, Koulukino has established its position in media education in Finland, closely cooperating with schools, distributors, producers and cinemas.

Watching a film on a big screen is a great experience and preparation is important. Educators base their choice (from a list compiled by Koulukino) on the given maturity rating. Watching film then becomes a shared, safe experience for children and educators.

Koulukino stresses the importance of processing the film experience in school by use of our pedagogical material. The dossiers for high schools can be combined with various subjects such as history, religion, psychology or art. Material for the small children guides the educator in creating a safe film experience and to process what has been seen through various exercises. The teachers' feedback has been very encouraging: they actively use Koulukino's material and find it helpful. (Marjo Kovanen)

FILM IN THE FOCUS

Oliver Ussing's MY GOOD ENEMY 'The innocent always pay the highest price for their innocence'

MY GOOD ENEMY takes it one step further than the usual bullying-

movies. With small "guerrilla" actions Alf and Toke join forces to take revenge upon their bullies. But the situation grows out of their hands into a real social movement. Revenge turns into war, guerrilla turns into politics. Both boys react in a very different way: one with repulsion, the other enjoys his status as the school's new tyrant.

Oliver Ussing: "I wanted to make a movie about politics, and I wanted to make it exciting and keep it free of fantasy elements: no magic mirrors or supernatural beings."


'Bullying' is a common theme in films for a young audience. You deal with it in a quite daring way. That makes it hard to find the right target audience. Ussing: "It's an illusion to assume that we can control children's access to movies. Therefore, instead of trying to limit the audience, we should supply them with as much quality content as possible. I try not to think much about "finding the right audience" while making a movie. Others are much better at selling movies than I am."

Was it clear from the start this story would go deeper than just '2 kids taking revenge on the bullies'?

Ussing: "I co-wrote the screenplay with Søren Grinderselv Hansen based on a Danish youth novel, completing the cycle from underdog to kingpin and back down again. There is no right or wrong for the characters. No one wakes up looking in the mirror, saving: "I am evil". We all do what we do for the want of love. I was sure about the ending: it was important that good didn't win over evil. The choices we make as individuals are the only thing that matters. What makes people go different ways? Even the worst dictators once were infants and had a mother who loved them. Power is very enthralling and can become addictive."

Are you aware of the fact that this film might go down in history as 'the one in which the rabbit got killed'? Is that the consequence of 'staying consequent until the end'?

Ussing: "Isn't it interesting that audiences find the rabbit being harmed to be the worst to happen in the movie? The innocent always pay the highest price for their innocence. Although I consider beating up "chief bully" Mathias a much more reprehensible act from a moral point of view. People are shocked because the illusion works: they believe the rabbit is killed and react viscerally towards the film as an "evil film" made by "cruel filmmakers". Of course none of the three stunt rabbits were harmed in any way."



Ussing: "With my co-writer we spent time at a school, sitting at the back of a classroom. After two days, when the novelty wore off and pupils went about their day as if we weren't there, the power games in the class became blatantly clear. I don't believe teachers who say they cannot see what's going on. It means they don't want to see. I've seen DIE WELLE – plus the original version – and LORD OF THE FLIES. I wanted this movie to put a blame on "mass psychosis". I think we are responsible towards the community for our actions as individuals."

Grown-ups are like 99 % absent in this movie. Why?

Ussing: "I wanted to make a film about the power struggle in a class. So the highest authority needed to be a pupil. If I would suddenly introduce a higher authority from outside (police, parents, teachers), that would be like cheating.

The other reason is that, speaking with young people, I realized how little their parents are part of their world. There is a parallel life grown-ups don't have access to. Some types of bullying are easy to talk about: "he took my food, my money, he called me names,..." But there's another type of bullying that is even too humiliating to discuss with grown-ups. Bullies are aware of that. Parents should take so-called "harmless bullying" more serious."

I particularly liked the scenes in which the comic book came to live. Where do these comic book pictures come from?

Ussing: "We created the comic book for the movie and had comic book artist Ignacio Ferreras drawing the required pages. We wrote Niccolo's story, based on a mixture of classic hero's journey tales and "The Prince" by Niccolo Machiavelli."

I was impressed by the movie's sound design.

Ussing: "The sound designer and I have worked together on all our movies, developing a mutual understanding. We both admire Alan Splet's work. On this movie we contacted his widow who gladly gave us all the insect sounds recorded for BLUE VELVET. We used them extensively. There are creepycrawly beetle sounds everywhere!" (GH)
